This understanding prompted him to change his playing attitude and start paying more attention to the coordination with other instruments, strictly following the overall rhythm. This effectively improved the collaboration level of the orchestra, enabling the smooth rehearsal of the "Radetzky March". Through this experience, the members of the orchestra learned to listen and collaborate with each other during performance, and jointly pursue

harmony and perfection in musical works. In wind ensemble, each teenager's instrument is a unique source of sound. which affected the overall effect. To address this issue, the members of the band have decided to communicate through nonverbal means. Before reaching that section, they use eye contact and slight nodding gestures to unify the rhythm, ensuring that all instruments increase their volume at the same time. After multiple rehearsals and adjustments, the members of the orchestra gradually adapted to this communication style, reached a consensus on playing techniques, and cooperated more seamlessly. This tacit understanding is not only reflected in the part of increasing the volume, but also runs through the performance of the entire piece. The mutual understanding and trust among band members have deepened, and the team collaboration process has been optimized. With the smooth communication and improvement of tacit understanding, the orchestra's fluency and expressiveness in playing the "Radetzky March" have significantly increased.
